### Programme information and content

The Programme aims to provide you with knowledge and understanding of a variety of literary, cultural and historical texts from a range of periods and backgrounds. Anglophone materials will be studied alongside those translated into English. The course also aims to foster an independent approach to formulating problems and arguments, through the development and application of close reading and analytical skills. Individual modules come with the option of an academic placement which complements and develops the learning on a module.

Part 1:	Introduces you to debate about approaches to the study of literature, through critical and research exercises and close study of selected Anglophone and translated texts from a number of different periods.
Part 2:	Develops the thinking fostered at Part 1 and delves into the detail of particular genres and traditions. A range of optional modules spanning diverse genres and traditions allows you to develop your scholarly interests.
Part 3:	A wide range of optional modules spanning diverse genres and traditions allows you to specialize according to your scholarly interests. The dissertation module complements this, allowing you to develop your skills in research, planning, and writing.

### Module information

Each part comprises 120 credits, allocated across a range of compulsory and optional modules as shown below. Compulsory modules are listed.

#### Part 1 Modules:

Remaining credits will come from a list of optional modules available in the Department of Languages and Cultures and the Department of English Literature.

Up to 20 credits may be selected from modules available elsewhere in the University.

### **Part 2 Modules:**

60 credits will be taken from the standard list of English literature modules.

60 credits will come from a list of optional modules looking at literature from a comparative angle, provided by the programme director of Comparative Literature programmes, available in the Department of Languages and Cultures and the Department of English Literature.

Up to 20 credits may be selected from modules available elsewhere in the University, with the permission of the Programme Director.

If you take a year-long placement or study abroad, Part 3 as described below may be subject to variation.

### **Part 3 Modules:**

Remaining credits will come from a list of optional modules available in the Department of English Literature and the Department of Languages and Cultures.

Up to 20 credits may be selected from modules available elsewhere in the University, with the permission of the Programme Director.

### **Optional modules:**

The optional modules available can vary from year to year. An indicative list of the range of optional modules for your Programme is set out in the Further Programme Information. Details of optional modules for each part, including any Additional Costs associated with the optional modules, will be made available to you prior to the beginning of the Part in which they are to be taken and you will be given an opportunity to express interest in the optional modules that you would like to take. Entry to optional modules will be at the discretion of the University and subject to availability and may be subject to pre-requisites, such as completion of another module. Although the University tries to ensure you are able to take the optional modules in which you have expressed interest this cannot be guaranteed.

### **Additional costs of the programme**

During your programme of study you will incur some additional costs.

For textbooks and similar learning resources, we recommend that you budget between £150 and £250 per year. Many books are available second-hand, which will reduce costs. A range

of resources to support your curriculum, including textbooks and electronic resources, are available through the library. Reading lists and module specific costs are listed on the individual module descriptions. Printing and photocopying facilities are available on campus at a cost of £0.05 per page. Costs will be, on average, £50 per year.

Costs are indicative and may vary according to optional modules chosen and are subject to inflation and other price fluctuations. The estimates were calculated in 2019.

### **Placement opportunities**

Placements are available to students taking the optional modules ML2LLM Literature, Language, and the Media / EN2CAW Communications at Work / LS2LLE Literature, Language and Education. Here you will be required to find and secure a placement opportunity, with the support of the University.

You may be provided with the opportunity to undertake a Study Abroad placement during your Programme. This is subject to you meeting academic conditions detailed in the Programme Handbook, including obtaining the relevant permissions from your School, and the availability of a suitable Study Abroad placement. If you undertake a Study Abroad placement, further arrangements will be discussed and agreed with you.

### **Teaching and learning delivery:**

You will be taught through lectures, seminars/tutorials and supervised project work. The Dissertation module is supported by workshops and individual supervision.

Total study hours for each Part of your programme will be 1200 hours. The contact hours for your programme will depend upon your module combination; an average for a typical set of modules on this programme is Part 1 - 252 hours, Part 2 - 144 hours, Part 3 - 144 hours. In addition to your scheduled contact hours, you will be expected to undertake guided independent study. Information about module contact hours and the amount of independent study which a student is normally expected to undertake for a module is indicated in the relevant module description.

### **Assessment**

The programme will be assessed through a combination of written examinations, coursework (including class tests) and oral examinations. Further information is contained in the individual module descriptions.

### **Progression**

The University-wide rules relating to 'threshold performance' are as follows:

### *Part 1*

- (i) Obtain an overall average of 40% over 120 credits taken in Part 1; and
- (ii) Obtain a mark of at least 30% in individual modules amounting to at least 100 credits taken in Part 1.

In order to progress from Part 1 to Part 2, a student must achieve a threshold performance; and

- (iii) Obtain a mark of at least 40% in all compulsory modules at Part 1 (EN1PE, EN1RC, ML1COMP, ML1TRANS).

The achievement of a threshold performance at Part 1 qualifies a student for a Certificate of Higher Education if they leave the University before completing the subsequent Part.

### *Part 2*

To gain a threshold performance at Part 2, which is necessary for progression to part 3, a student shall normally be required to:

- (i) obtain a weighted average of 40% over 120 credits taken at Part 2; and
- (ii) obtain marks of at least 40% in individual modules amounting to at least 80 credits; and
- (iii) obtain marks of at least 30% in individual modules amounting to at least 120 credits, except that a mark below 30% may be condoned in no more than 20 credits of modules owned by the Department of Mathematics and Statistics.

The achievement of a threshold performance at Part 2 qualifies a student for a Diploma of Higher Education if they leave the University before completing the subsequent Part.
