# Enhancing Feedback Provision at Reading: The ASSET Project

18 month JISC funded project (extended until 31st July 2010)

• Enhance the feedback experience for staff and students through the development of Web 2.0 resource, 'ASSET'

• Explore the use of video for supporting provision of timely, quality feedback & feed-forward



## **ASSET Pilot Study**

#### **Participants**

- 5 disciplinary areas
- Over 500 students
- Piloted during Autumn Term 2009/2010 for generic feedback
- University of Plymouth pilot study

#### Data collection (staff & students)

- Pre-and post-use online surveys
- Post-use focus groups



#### **Staff Results**

- •8 staff completed the post-use survey:
  - All said they would use video again for feedback provision
  - 6 said they had enjoyed using video
  - 7 said they would recommend using video for feedback provision to colleagues
- The most common type of video used was 'Talking Head'



#### **Staff Results**

- 62% of staff said that on average it took them less than 20 minutes to produce a video
- 75% of staff said it took the same time or less to provide video feedback compared to their normal methods
- 87% of staff felt students took the same or more notice of the feedback compared to their normal methods
- Most staff felt that using video has changed their approach to feedback provision



#### **Staff Results**

#### Advantages:

"It has the immediacy of a lecture, but can be replayed. It suits some students better than generic written feedback"

"Can put into words the information that needs to be conveyed. Can use screencasts to show students what to do"

#### Challenges:

"Getting students to play the videos"

"Ensuring it covers all the relevant issues and is not too brief"



- 100 students responded to the post-use survey
- 61 Female, 39 male
- 81 students said they would want their lecturer to keep using video for feedback:
  - 63% for small groups
  - 58% for generic feedback
  - 39.5% for one-to-one feedback
  - 21% for work placements



- 78 said they liked receiving video feedback:
  - 10 because of the visual/verbal nature
  - 7 because it had more information/was more in-depth
  - 6 because it was more personal
  - 6 because it could be re-played
  - 5 because it could be accessed anytime
- •16 students didn't like video for feedback:
  - 10 preferred written or face-to-face
  - 5 said it wasn't easily accessible (i.e. you had to go online to access it)
  - 4 didn't like the generic nature of feedback
  - 3 said it felt 'impersonal'



- Most students watched the videos more than once:
  - 36 watched a video twice
  - 22 watched a video 3 or 4 times
  - 3 students watched a video 5+ times
- 13 watched videos with their peers
- 59 discussed the video with others



"It was easier to gauge the reaction and emphasis of a lecturer by watching a video than it was through written feedback"

"Watching and listening to someone speak says more than reading feedback"

"Would much prefer to receive feedback in person. Video feedback seems impersonal"

"One-to-one feedback is easier if you have questions, you can get answers straight away"
