Programme information and content

Our BA Modern Languages enables you to develop a high level of proficiency in your core language(s) alongside deepening your knowledge of related cultures and societies. The culture modules are informed by staff research specialisms and will allow you to analyse and interpret a range of cultural material; understand and critically apply key concepts; and develop and demonstrate independence of thought and sensitivity to cultural difference. Our teaching places an emphasis on interactive, student-centred learning.

This Programme is highly flexible and provides you with the option of choosing among studying one, two or three languages. You will be able to choose among a range of core languages, which will allow you to progress in your language competence and achieve level C1 (or above) of the Common European Framework of Reference (CEFR), whilst also studying language-specific culture modules. When studying one or two core languages, you can opt to add one additional language from a wide range of languages on offer. You will be able to access this language at beginner level and reach level B1 (independent user) in the CEFR by the end of your degree course. You may also be able to cover cultural aspects relevant to the additional language through optional cross-cultural modules. Only one core language may be taken at beginner level; a second language at beginner level may be taken as an additional language. Your degree transcript will specify which languages you have studied and which levels you have achieved in each of them.

On occasion, the individual personal and academic circumstances of 3 year BA students taking certain Modern Languages pathways (e.g., two core languages) within this programme may require some minor modifications to the Part 2 and Part 3 module choices specified in this programme: the Department Director of Teaching and Learning, and then if necessary the appropriate Programme Director will consult with and advise such students on their module selection options.

Studying a modern language opens a variety of career paths. These include careers in business and marketing, publishing, international organisations and charities, teaching and translation. The degree will equip you with a range of transferable skills, including

	d evaluating evidence, structuring ideas and communicating them ntercultural competence.
Part 1:	Develops your practical language skills in your core language modules in all four areas (speaking, writing, reading, listening). You will also have the opportunity to understand and apply key terms in the structural analysis of language. The culture modules provide you with a sound understanding of key issues and developments in language and relevant history and culture.
Part 2:	Further develops your practical language skills in your core language modules in all four areas (speaking, writing, reading, listening), building on the work done in Part 1. The culture modules provide you with an opportunity to encounter and critically engage with a range of material in the target language, such as films, literature, essays and historical documents, enhancing your ability to apply a range of analytical concepts as well as approaches to the critical analysis of this material.
Placement/Study abroad year:	The Year Abroad will give you the opportunity to apply and enhance your practical language skills in either a work or study environment, or a combination of both. You will further develop your adaptability and self-reliance as well as your sensitivity to cultural difference.
Part 3:	Gives you the opportunity to build on your existing language skills. In your core language modules you will refine your use of more complicated structures as well as variations in register and style. The culture modules will give you an opportunity to engage deeply and critically with topics based on staff research specialisms and to apply concepts and approaches for critical analysis to an increased amount of material in the target language.

Module information

Each part comprises 120 credits, allocated across a range of compulsory and optional modules as shown below. Compulsory modules are listed.

For students taking two core languages:

Part 3 Modules:

For students taking one core language:

Students must take one 20-credit module in the chosen language, to reach level C1 (or above) of the CEFR.

Students must take at least two 20-credit culture modules in the chosen language.

Your remaining credits will be made up of optional modules available in the Department of Languages and Cultures. Of these, 20 credits can be from modules available from an approved list.

Alongside their core language, students can also opt to take one 20-credit module to complete the study of the additional language chosen at Part 1, to reach level B1 in the CEFR.

For students taking two core languages:

Students must take one 20-credit module in each of the chosen languages, to reach level C1 (or above) of the CEFR.

Placement opportunities

You may be provided with the opportunity to undertake a credit-bearing placement as part of your Programme. This will form all or part of an optional module. You will be required to find and secure a placement opportunity, with the support of the University.

Optional modules:

The optional modules available can vary from year to year. An indicative list of the range of optional modules for your programme can be found online in the Course Catalogue. Details of optional modules for each part, including any additional costs associated with the optional modules, will be made available to you prior to the beginning of the Part in which they are to be taken and you will be given an opportunity to express interest in the optional modules that you would like to take. Entry to optional modules will be at the discretion of the University and subject to availability and may be subject to pre-requisites, such as completion of another module. Although the University tries to ensure you are able to take the optional modules in which you have expressed interest this cannot be guaranteed.

Teaching and learning delivery:

You will be taught through a mix of seminars, language classes and lectures. Some modules may include group work.

Elements of your programme will be delivered via digital technology.

The scheduled teaching and learning activity hours and amount of technology enhanced learning activity for your programme will depend upon your module combination. In addition, you will undertake some self-scheduled teaching and learning activities, designed

by and/or involving staff, which give some flexibility for you to choose when to complete them. You will also be expected to undertake guided independent study. Information about module study hours including contact hours and the amount of independent study which a student is normally expected to undertake for a module is indicated in the relevant module description.

Assessment

The programme will be assessed through a combination of written examinations or tests, coursework and oral examinations. Further information is contained in the individual module descriptions.

Progression

Part 1

To achieve a threshold performance at Part 1, a student will normally be required to:

- (i) Obtain an overall weighted average of 40% over 120 credits taken in Part 1;
- (ii) Obtain a mark of at least 40% in individual modules amounting to not less than 80 credits taken in Part 1; and
- (iii) Obtain marks of at least 30% in modules amounting to 120 credits. (A Fail in a Pass/Fail module will be treated as not meeting the minimum threshold requirement for progression or classification. Pass/fail modules are excluded from weighted average calculations but must be passed to avoid failure of the Part or degree.)

In order to progress from Part 1 to Part 2, a student must achieve a threshold performance; and

(iii) Obtain a mark of at least 40% in a 20-credit core language module.

For students wishing to continue studying more than one core language the following will apply:

For students continuing with two core languages:

(iii) Obtain a mark of at least 40% in the two 20-credit core language modules.

For students continuing with three core languages:

(iii) Obtain a mark of at least 40% in the three 20-credit core language modules.

The achievement of a threshold performance at Part 1 qualifies a student for a Certificate of Higher Education if they leave the University before completing the subsequent Part.

Students wishing to transfer into the programme at Part 2 must have taken a minimum of 40 credits of modules at level 4 from the Department of Languages and Cultures,

comprising one language module and one language-specific culture module. For students who wish to transfer into BA Modern Languages at Part 2 and study one core language only there is no requirement to have taken 80 credits of modules at Part 1 from the Department of Languages and Cultures.

Students who have taken two or three core languages at Part 1 but wish to continue with only one core language from Part 2 may do so even if they have only taken one language module and one language-specific culture module in that language at Part 1.

Students are able to transfer from a Joint or Major/Minor Honours programme to a Single Honours programme in one of their joint subject areas at the end of Part 1, subject to:

- Meeting the University Threshold Standard at the end of Part 1; and
- Achieving marks of at least 40% in at least 40 credits of modules (e.g., 2 x 20 credit modules) in the subject to which they wish to transfer; and
- Meeting any programme-specific progression rules for the Part 1 Single Honours Programme to which they wish to transfer.

NB Students taking a Major/Minor programme may only transfer to a Single Honours programme in the Major subject and must meet the above requirements.

Students should seek advice about the titles of programmes they may be eligible to transfer to.

Students who transfer from a Joint or Major/Minor Honours programme to a Single Honours programme may not have taken all of the Part 1 modules listed in the Single Honours Programme Specification. The modules which they have taken will be shown on their Diploma Supplement.

Part 2

To achieve a threshold performance at Part 2, a student shall normally be required to:

- (i) Obtain a weighted average of 40% over 120 credits taken in Part 2; and
- (ii) Obtain marks of at least 40% in individual modules amounting to at least 80 credits taken in Part 2; and
- (iii) Obtain marks of at least 30% in individual modules amounting to at least 120 credits. (A Fail in a Pass/Fail module will be treated as not meeting the minimum threshold requirement for progression or classification. Pass/fail modules are excluded from weighted average calculations but must be passed to avoid failure of the Part or degree.)

In order to progress from Part 2 to Part 3, a student must achieve a threshold performance; and

(iv) Obtain a pass in the Year Abroad

The achievement of a threshold performance at Part 2 qualifies a student for a Diploma of Higher Education if they leave the University before completing the subsequent Part.

Students who have taken three core languages may drop one between Parts 2 and 3 if desired, or continue it as an additional language to reach at least B1 level in the CEFR.

- Section 18: Awards (Integrated Master's programmes). Students who do not progress to Part 4 of the Integrated Master's will normally be subject to the method detailed under Section 17: Awards (Bachelor's)

Additional costs of the programme

During your programme of study you will incur some additional costs. For textbooks and similar learning resources, we recommend that you budget between £100-£150 a year. The core textbook(s), which most students normally purchase,

approximately £25 new, and there may be other books/resources which you would find it convenient to buy. Some books may be available second-hand, which will reduce costs. A range of resources to support your curriculum, including textbooks and electronic resources, are available through the library. Reading lists and module specific costs are listed on the individual module descriptions.

Printing and photocopying facilities are available on campus at a cost of £0.05 per page. Costs will be, on average, £50 per year.

For students studying on a year abroad, a discounted fee of 15% of the normal Tuition Fee is payable to the University for the year abroad, as detailed in the Fees Policy. No Tuition

Fee is paid to the host institution abroad for which there is a valid exchange agreement in place.

Year Abroad: You may incur additional costs, in addition to those which you would normally expect to pay at the University, during your year abroad, in accordance with clause 6.4 of the Terms and Conditions for Undergraduate Students. These additional costs will depend on your host institution and destination, but may include the purchase of a visa, and mandatory medical insurance. Students will be briefed on these issues prior to them submitting the form detailing the institutions to which they would like to be allocated, and general information on additional costs is discussed in the Year Abroad preparatory meetings. Further indicative details on costs and funding are available on the UoR Erasmus

& Study Abroad webpages and the webpages of the host institution.

Costs are indicative and may vary according to optional modules chosen and are subject to inflation and other price fluctuations. Estimates were calculated in 2025.
