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At the University of Reading we don't just talk, we take action. Our ambition is to be recognised as the greenest university, and we're taking a lead in finding lasting solutions to save our planet.

TAKING ACTION

We're not just green because of our beautiful campuses. We're ranked 4th in the 2022/23 People & Planet University League¹ and we're committed to reaching net zero carbon by 2030². We've already reduced our carbon footprint by half, only 2% of our waste goes to landfill, and 100% of our electricity has come from renewable sources since 2009.

We're the first university in Europe to join the Menus of Change Universities Research Collaborative, which aims to provide healthy and sustainable meals on campus, and we've added several environmentally friendly, plant-based recipes to our menus.

LEADING CHANGE

The University is a world leader in climate science³, recently winning a Queen's Anniversary Prize⁴. Reading scientists played a central role in creating the UN Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change report released in August 2021. And to lead change for the next generation, we are working with the UK government's Department for Education and others to improve climate education for eight- to 18-year-olds in schools.

Our climate experts are also working to inspire local people, organisations, and businesses to contribute to the fight against climate change. We worked with Reading Borough Council to develop a Climate Action Plan for a net zero carbon town, and every year we host many public events showcasing this work, including as part of the annual Reading Climate Festival.



GETTING INVOLVED

We want to empower all of our students with the skills and knowledge needed to help build a sustainable future for all. Sign up to our free online Planet Partners short course⁵ to learn what you can do to take meaningful action against the climate crisis. You can also gain awareness of sustainability issues while enhancing your employability via the Reading Experience and Development Sustainable Action Award.

Many of our students also take up volunteering opportunities with organisations like ZSL Instant Wild and Zooniverse. Plus, you can take part in clothes swaps, get involved in our Sustainability Fayre, and get rewarded for taking positive actions via our sustainability engagement student platform, Doing #UoRBit.

READING TOWN

Reading is a global town: a centre of innovation, cultural diversity, creativity, and technology.

Sitting on the doorstep of one of the greatest capital cities in the world, it has a lively, international community of its own, welcoming cultural diversity. The vibrant town centre boasts a huge variety of restaurants offering cuisines from around the world, bars, parks and entertainment, with stunning countryside close by. Grounded in rich history and heritage, the town is also home to the headquarters of international businesses and is a place to make connections and seize opportunities. That's why thousands of our graduates now call Reading home.



BEAUTIFUL GREEN SPACES

There's no shortage of places to unwind in Reading. Relax in the town's many parks or take in the leafy riverside walks. The river Thames flows through the centre of town, close to the Victorian Forbury Gardens which play host to a buzzing market of global cuisines every summer. The nearby Abbey Ruins hosts open-air theatre, cinema and other cultural events and is the perfect place to explore Reading's medieval history.



GREAT CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

The University is located in a region with a buoyant economy¹, providing a wealth of career opportunities for our students. International organisations such as Microsoft, Oracle, Procter & Gamble, and PwC have long been located here. The arts and creative industries have made Reading their home, too, with

a major new film and TV studio complex, Shinfield Studios (image above), located on the University's land. With its ability to capture investors' attention², Reading provides the opportunity to progress your career, no matter in which industry your ambitions lie.



EASY TO REACH

Reading is very well connected by rail and road. The main train station is easily accessible from most places in the UK. The regular fast trains to London Paddington take just 23 minutes, while the addition of the new Elizabeth Line means that travel from Reading to central London is equally simple.

Access to the UK's two major airports is also convenient: Heathrow Airport is easy to reach by rail or road in less than an hour and Gatwick Airport in under two.

Both Whiteknights campus and London Road campus are just a few miles from the M4 motorway. Getting to us from the town centre is straightforward – enjoy the walk or make use of the 24-hour bus service that brings you right onto campus.





ARRIVING IN THE UK

Getting to us from international airports London Heathrow and London Gatwick is easy. The journey between Reading train station and London Heathrow takes only 45 minutes by direct RailAir coach, and London Gatwick is less than two hours away by train.

SETTLING IN AT READING

Our Welcome programme of events, tours and information sessions will help you settle into life in Reading and the UK. These include academic and social events, information sessions covering everything from study advice to feeling at home, maps of Reading, guides to opening a bank account, and more.

Once you've settled in here, you can take full advantage of our excellent transport links to explore nearby London, Oxford and Windsor – or further afield (see page 13).

PRACTICAL INFORMATION

- Visa support. Dedicated immigration advisers can provide specialist advice on student-related visas and information on visa conditions associated with student visas, including hours and type of work permitted during your studies. You can also find information on the Graduate Route post-study work visa, which provides an opportunity for eligible international graduates to stay in the UK and work for two years with a master's degree or three years with a doctoral degree. - UK healthcare. Overseas students studying in the UK on a programme that lasts longer than six months are entitled to medical treatment here. You may need to pay a healthcare surcharge as part of your immigration application.

MEET AYOMIPO



For me, the University of Reading should be everyone's top choice.

Why did you choose Reading?

Because of its ranking, the easy access to London, and the interesting cultural and social activities. I also chose Reading because of the rich modules available in my area of specialisation. My course is centred around international commercial law, with a pathway in information technology. The world is becoming a global village with innovations and inventions in the area of technology, and I am interested in how trade, finance and other commercial sectors are affected by this.

Why did you decide to do a master's degree?

For exposure to novel areas of research that I was unable to get during my undergraduate study. Also for interactions with professionals, and for the extra-curricular activities and volunteering opportunities as a master's student. For example, I have helped to train children for an interschool mock trial competition at Reading's Crown Court, which fuelled my knowledge about how the adjudicatory system works in the UK

Did you meet us before submitting your application?

Yes, I attended an in-person information session back in Nigeria. It was helpful in giving me knowledge about the University's campus, facilities, other faculties like Henley Business School, and a deeper insight into my chosen course of study.

Did you have any worries before coming to Reading?

My main worry was the culture shock, being an international student. However, the diversity and inclusion at the University have allayed all my worries, from the lecturers to the student representation, cultural events and so on.

I signed up to have a STaR mentor (a current student) who helped me a great deal to settle in. We met a couple of times, and the sessions were informative and helpful. The Welcome Week activities organised by the School of Law and the wider University also helped me to meet other students.

What are your plans for after graduation?

I hope to join the labour market in Reading or neighbouring cities and to requalify as a lawyer in the long run. I enjoyed the data privacy module on my programme and I believe that the master's degree will help me succeed as a data protection expert in the near future.

MEET SIVA



Established for over 20 years, our Students in Schools scheme places student volunteers in local schools, to help school children flourish and University students develop their personal and employability skills.

Siva, a food technology master's student from India, shares his experiences.

Why did you decide to volunteer?

I have always had a passion for teaching and working with children. The scheme allowed me to contribute to – and build a strong network within – the local community and make a positive impact on the lives of young students.

Tell us about your role.

I have volunteered at a primary school and have been involved in various activities, including teaching basic English and math skills to Year 1 students. I have also helped the staff during physical education periods, helping the students with their exercises and ensuring their safety.

What have you gained from taking part?

Overall, participating in the scheme has given me a sense of fulfilment and a deeper understanding of the educational environment. Interacting with school students from diverse backgrounds and abilities has improved my adaptability, communication, leadership and problem-solving skills.

What is the best thing about the scheme?

The opportunity to make a positive impact on the lives of young students. Witnessing their progress and growth, both academically and personally, is incredibly rewarding. My proudest moment so far has been when I observed a struggling student improve their math skills over time through my guidance and support. Seeing their confidence and enthusiasm for learning flourish has been truly gratifying.

GET INVOLVED IN THE LOCAL COMMUNITY

With around 150 languages spoken in schools in the local area, Reading's international students are perfectly placed to support children with little-to-no English. Last year, our volunteers worked with young people whose native languages included Arabic, Mandarin, Polish, Turkish, Spanish, Hungarian, Russian, Hindi, Korean and Italian. WHITEKNIGHTS CAMPUS

Our main campus, Whiteknights, is the hub of University of Reading life.

Set in 320 acres of stunning parkland, it offers plenty of places to eat, shop, study and socialise – everything you need is in one place.

It is home to the Library, Reading Students' Union, two on-site museums, shops, cafes, and other amenities such as 3 sixty, a large venue that hosts a variety of student-led events. The campus also houses many of our teaching and research facilities, including modern, well-equipped study areas, as well as several halls of residence all of which are within a 15-minute walk from the Library.

Our Doctoral and Researcher College is also found at the heart of Whiteknights campus. Based in Old Whiteknights House – a beautiful, modernised Victorian building – it is the centre of all doctoral activity and provides dedicated space for our postgraduate researchers. Discover more on page 132.

LONDON ROAD CAMPUS



A short walk from both Whiteknights campus and the town centre, our London Road campus is a peaceful setting of traditional cloisters and green spaces.

It's a historic site – one of the University's original campuses – and is home to the School of Architecture and the Institute of Education. It is also the base for the University's music programme with dedicated practice rooms, instrument storage facilities, and the main performance venue, The Great Hall – which is also the primary venue for our graduation ceremonies.

The campus has two on-site cafes including The Dairy, which serves local and global craft beers and food, and provides a friendly place to play pool and watch sporting events.

Used by the University's Henley Business School, it's the base for some of our part-time, post-experience master's degrees, including Henley's Executive Master in Business Administration (EMBA) programmes and the Doctor of Business Administration (DBA). It also hosts a comprehensive range of Executive Education and corporate learning programmes, and many applied research centres.

READING STUDENTS' UNION

When you enrol at Reading, you automatically become a member of the students' union, an independent student-led charity based on the Whiteknights campus. They work to create positive change for students and deliver essential services, and they support 80+ societies – including arts, dance, culture, faith, career, campaigns, causes, and politics – and 55+ sports clubs for all interests and abilities. Through the union, you can also get involved in student media outlets and a range of volunteering opportunities.

The largest venue in the students' union, 3sixty, hosts all kinds of events, including a weekly fresh fruit and veg market, vintage clothes fairs, jobs fairs, drama and dance performances, debates, and more. It is also home to the ever-popular union nights, becoming the largest nightclub in town – but only for our students.

THE LIBRARY

The centrepiece of Whiteknights campus is our Library.

It provides access to thousands of digital resources, and inside you'll find substantial print resources spread over six floors. The Library has extensive opening hours with staff there to guide you to the materials you need for your postgraduate studies – and to help you make the best use of them.

Popular features include:

- group, quiet and silent study spaces to accommodate different learning styles
- a large cafe serving a wide selection of grab-and-go and dine-in options
- an outdoor seating and study area.

MUSEUMS AND COLLECTIONS

In addition to our fantastic Library, the University of Reading is home to a variety of collections and three on-campus museums:

- Ure Museum of Greek Archaeology
- Cole Museum of Zoology
- Museum of English Rural Life.

From ancient pottery and medieval literature to the work of Samuel Beckett and the history of rural England, the University's museums and collections span an extraordinary range of subjects.

If you don't need to use them for your studies via departments or the **Special Collections Service**, you can still get involved through events, activities and volunteering opportunities.



GLOBAL LEARNING COMMUNITY

Join our culturally diverse community of more than 8,200 postgraduate students from 120 countries.¹

At Reading, you'll have plenty of opportunities to learn about different cultures and study new languages, beyond what may be required by your degree. And if English isn't your first language, you can access a free programme to develop your academic English skills.



LEARN A LANGUAGE

Whether you want to boost your employability by broadening your skillset, prepare for living or working abroad in the future, or simply for your own personal development and enjoyment, learning a foreign language alongside your postgraduate degree can be a fantastic experience. Through our Institution-Wide Language Programme (IWLP) at Poording to the programme (IWLP) at

Reading, you can join fellow students as a beginner or continue a language you already know to a higher level.

We currently offer Arabic, British Sign Language, Chinese (Mandarin), French, German, Italian, Japanese, Modern Greek, Russian and Spanish.

PRE-SESSIONAL ENGLISH

If you need to improve your English language level to meet the requirements of your academic offer, you can take a Pre-Sessional English (PSE) course at the University's International Study and Language Institute (ISLI).

These academic language and skills courses help you to reach the English language level required for your degree programme. You develop key academic language skills in reading, writing, listening and speaking, as well as developing your knowledge of academic culture. By engaging in the kind of tasks and assignments

you are expected to complete in your academic departments, you will also become familiar with the expectations of higher education in the UK.

By taking this course, you may also be entitled to a combined CAS,² covering your PSE course and degree programme, that could allow you to progress directly from your PSE course onto your degree programme. We will confirm if you are eligible when considering your PSE application.

If you have already met the language requirement for your course, we also offer a four-week Postgraduate Success Programme³ to help you prepare for academic life and enable you to get the most out of your master's degree.

ACADEMIC ENGLISH PROGRAMME

The **Academic English Programme** (AEP) is run by ISLI and is free to all fee-paying international students.

Our courses, webinars and oneto-one consultations will help you develop your academic language and skills while you study. Our lecturers are experts in academic language and literacy, and we work closely with academic departments across the University to ensure our courses focus on the language and communication skills you will need for your degree.

For doctoral researchers, ISLI delivers a number of courses specifically focused on the language and skills needed to write a doctoral thesis. These are run in collaboration with the Doctoral and Researcher College.



GLOBAL STUDY LOUNGE

Catering to all students and the wider University community, our **Global Study Lounge** is a multipurpose facility that supports and facilitates global engagement and intercultural communication through its programme of events and volunteering opportunities. The Global Study Lounge offers students a place to study and socialise, and supports teaching and learning by hosting Academic English surgeries and academic tutorials in a space that brings together learners from across the University.

FLEXIBLE STUDY OPTIONS

At the University of Reading, our programmes span academic and vocational study, with many of our master's courses offering professional accreditation.

STUDIES TO SUIT YOU

- Specialise in the subject you studied at undergraduate level, or broaden your horizons with a new one – you can apply for many of our master's programmes even if you haven't studied the subject for your undergraduate degree.
- Choose between full-time and parttime master's programmes to suit your needs and commitments.
- Fit professional qualifications around your employment demands.



DEGREE OPTIONS

We offer a number of different postgraduate qualifications at Reading, including:

Master of Arts (MA), Master of Science (MSc), Master of Laws (LLM)

These programmes are made up of 180 credits, which are usually achieved through a mix of compulsory and optional modules. Depending on the programme, you'll be assessed through a combination of coursework, exams and a dissertation.

Postgraduate Diploma (PGDip), Postgraduate Certificate (PGCert)

A postgraduate certificate is made up of 60 credits while a postgraduate diploma is 120 credits. For the diploma, you'll take all of the taught elements of the master's programme but you won't complete a 60-credit dissertation or research project. The modular nature of our degrees often means that you can build credits towards a master's qualification over a number of years. PGDips and PGCerts are only available in a few areas – please check the subject pages.

MA/MSc/LLM by Research

These programmes are based around a research project. It is a significant element of the degree and accounts for around two-thirds of the total credits, although you may also undertake a small number of taught modules. These programmes are perfect preparation for doctoral research.

Master of Research (MRes)

These programmes have a greater research component than an MA/MSc/LLM, but less than is required for an MA/MSc/LLM by Research. The dissertation and research methods modules make up more than half of the credits, but you'll still have some taught elements.

Professional development programmes

These span a variety of sectors and are designed for people in specific fields and roles. They can be delivered in a day or over longer periods of time as needed. Check our course webpages for full details.

The campus environment is also an important consideration, as this is where you will spend most of your time. For me, the University of Reading should be everyone's top choice."

This focus on employability contributes to the success of our master's graduates: 95% of our taught postgraduates are in work or further study within 15 months of the end of their course and, of those working full time, 96% are in graduate-level roles.

The Knowledge Transfer Centre at the University of Reading manages the national, government-backed **Knowledge Transfer Partnership** (KTP) programme—an exciting opportunity for our graduates to spend two or three years working on an innovation project that brings together university research and business to develop novel products, systems and services.



DAN'S STORY

While Dan was working on his master's research in typeface design, the Department of Typography & Graphic Communication was embarking on a knowledge transfer partnership (KTP) with a company that aligned perfectly with the content of his studies.

Having already spent time in Monotype's archives during his research, Dan found that he could apply his newfound research skills and understanding of non-Latin typographic issues directly to Monotype's business activities.

"What was useful about the KTP experience at Monotype was that my project required me to get to know people all over the company and understand different parts of the business, where a typical design position might not allow that much exposure to the company's overall activity."

After two years as a KTP associate, building his professional experience further and making useful industry connections, Dan was well prepared for his next role as a Senior Type Designer at Adobe.

"All my experiences and study at Reading – both the MA and the KTP – led me quite directly to that opportunity."

ENTREPRENEURSHIP IN PRACTICE

Whether you're aiming to start your own business, join an SME, work for a multinational corporation, or just want to understand more about business and innovation, our student entrepreneurship initiatives can help give you the tools, knowledge and confidence you need to succeed.

Activities at the Henley Centre for Entrepreneurship (HCfE) and the wider University are aimed at giving you plenty of opportunities to put entrepreneurship into practice.

HCfE, which is part of the tripleaccredited Henley Business School (AMBA, EQUIS and AACSB), hosts numerous exciting events and competitions that all students across campus can get involved in – no matter what subject you're studying.

HCfE is also heavily involved in the delivery of entrepreneurship education within Henley Business School and across the University, conducting several modules that are open to all undergraduate and postgraduate students. HCfE faculty also support and supervise PhD students pursuing doctoral research in the area of entrepreneurship.

IDEAFEST

IDEAFEST is an annual student business idea competition that motivates you to work on developing an idea that could someday be commercialised – with prize money awarded to the best concepts.



Finalists, like master's student Maymon Madathingal, are granted professional mentoring to

develop their business ideas, as well as a place on the Henley Summer Start-Up Boot Camp.

Maymon became an IDEAFEST finalist in 2023 with his idea, TalkieSpace, a platform where movie enthusiasts can ask owners of cinemas and other suitable facilities to play their favourite films on big screens.



AWARD-WINNING IDEA

The £500 second place IDEAFEST award went to Nor El Islam Messedad, an MSc Data Science and Advanced Computing student and Chevening Scholar, for BloodMatch, a health-tech platform that connects compatible blood donors with patients in need of a match. Nor was also chosen as a Greenshoots award winner.



START-UP BOOT CAMP

As a master's student, you can apply for a coveted spot on the annual Henley Summer Start-Up Boot Camp, a free, week-long course that helps students, alumni and local entrepreneurs gain the skills to set up a business from scratch. The course covers everything you would need to know as an aspiring business founder, from building a website to finding a target audience and making sales with minimal budget.

GREENSHOOTS SEED FINANCE AWARD

Greenshoots is an initiative to nurture and support start-ups set up by current students or recent graduates of the University of Reading or Henley Business School. Start-ups founded within the last three years that show the potential to grow and become sustainable businesses are awarded a cash prize to help them reach the next level.

A VOICE FOR THE VOICELESS

Mabel Senaa Bonsuuri is the Founder of iHelp Africa, a non-profit operating in the Volta region of Ghana. She completed her MSc Applied International Development at Reading in 2022.

Mabel founded iHelp Africa with a mission to improve the standard of living for the vulnerable in society, such as children, teenage mothers, substance users, and women, and to provide them with a platform that helps them become responsible and meet their potential.

One of iHelp Africa's projects is combatting period poverty, an issue that Mabel is passionate about and determined to help tackle through the One Girl One Box project.

"The main purpose of the
One Girl One Box project is to
help provide teenage girls with
menstrual hygiene products
in order to reduce absenteeism
in schools. Ensuring that girls
receive an education helps shape
a brighter future for them and
their families, as their education

becomes a springboard through which the entire family can break out of poverty."

The project has already supported more than 700 girls across 15 rural communities in Ghana.

OVERCOMING OBSTACLES

Jamie Gane is a maths teacher, adaptive athlete and motivational speaker. He completed a PGCE in Secondary Mathematics in 2020.

Nine months after undergoing a below-knee amputation, Jamie was back on the judo mat, his passion for sport well and truly reignited. He competes internationally under the Adaptive category, without the use of his prosthesis, winning silvers at his first British Judo Championships and the World Judo Games in 2019.

The same year, he joined Reading for a PGCE in Secondary Mathematics to pursue his passion for teaching, soon becoming a full-time maths teacher alongside his sporting career. He enjoyed his PGCE so much that he has since returned to Reading for an MA in Education

Jamie combines his two passions through motivational speaking at schools and organisations that invite him to discuss the practical and mental challenges of life as an amputee. His ambition is to be a role model to other young people who are in similar situations – to inspire them to believe they can overcome obstacles and see the opportunities open to them in the world of work and sport.

"The biggest issue I face, which is nice in some respects, is that by simply attending an event I can inspire some people. However, I'd rather inspire people because I've done inspirational things, rather than just by turning up. For example, I'd like to impress people for my abilities in my sport, rather than simply by competing as an adaptive athlete."



Jamie also competes internationally in Obstacle Course Racing (OCR) and has completed more courses than any other UK adaptive athlete, including more than 110 Tough Mudders. He also recently won Gold at the European OCR Championships. His aim is to get it classified as an Olympic sport – and, ultimately, into the Paralympics.

PROTECTING THE FUTURE

David Nangoma recently achieved his childhood dream of becoming a park ranger. He works for African Parks, which manages Nkhotakota Wildlife Reserve.

David initially came to the University of Reading for a short postgraduate course, but ended up returning six months later for a master's degree in the School of Biological Sciences on a British Chevening Scholarship.

His interest in wildlife and plant sciences began in his childhood when he was raised in the Serengeti National Park by his grandad. This led him to pursue studies and a career in conservation

Since graduating from Reading, David's career has taken him to Malawi's biodiversity hotspots including the Lake Chilwa Wetland, Mulanje Mountain Conservation Trust, and African Parks.

At African Parks – a non-profit conservation organisation that manages 22 protected areas in 12 countries on the African continent – David's previous role was to connect with the local community and get them onside with the importance of conservation.

"In my new role [as Park Manager], I have been tasked with managing a protected area with a restored Miombo woodland ecosystem ... where neighbouring communities are provided with opportunities for enhancing their livelihoods, and stakeholders fully support conservation efforts."

For the first time in decades, local communities are beginning to experience the benefits of the reserve. David has already achieved so much, but he still feels there is a long way to go.

"All I want to say to the world is 'let's be strong advocates to protect our ecosystems'."

A PLATFORM FOR CHANGE

Peter Ogudoro is one of three Reading graduates to be shortlisted for the British Council Study UK Alumni Awards 2022/23.

The award scheme recognises inspirational alumni who are using their UK education to make a real difference. Peter became a finalist due to the remarkable impact he has had within the teaching community in Nigeria – and, increasingly, around the globe.



Committed to creating positive social change, Peter founded the Nigerian Teachers community in 2016, which has a membership of more than half a million people. The community is a free continuing professional development platform that connects teachers from Nigeria and around the world and provides them with more effective tools.

"The mission is to overcome rote learning in the country's education system and put the learning needs of children and young people at the centre of the jobs that teachers do.

"The platform provides peergenerated free resources that empower teachers to reduce the gaps in their knowledge and skills in a grossly under-resourced education system." Peter has gone on to become one of Nigeria's leading education analysts and respected voices by the media due to his accomplishments in the education industry.

A life-enhancing experience

After graduating with a master's degree in Business Administration in Nigeria, Peter was eager to enhance his skills further. It was destiny that he encountered the University of Reading at an education fair where he discovered our master's degrees in International Development.

"I applied to study at Reading and found that decision life-enhancing, both for me and the people my work is benefiting. I had course mates from diverse countries and belonged to a community of staff and students from about 150 countries. This enabled me to develop an international network that gave my career wings.

"Some of my course modules were taught by industry practitioners including broadcasters from the BBC. I went on guided tours of the universities of Oxford and Cambridge, the British Museum, and several other places that exposed me to the history of global education and development.

"I also volunteered as a peer supporter as part of the Counselling and Wellbeing unit of the University of Reading, which gave me access to amazing values and skills including the empathetic disposition that is now driving my professional work."

Building on his master's degree

After working for the Nigeria Police Force training their spokespeople, military counterparts and paramilitary agencies across the country, Peter returned to Reading to pursue a PhD in Education.

"My doctoral training built on my master's training to provide me with knowledge, skills, values, and the international network that gave birth to the Nigerian Teachers online platform.

"I attended over 70 workshops organised by the University's Doctoral and Researcher College [formerly known as the Graduate School]. I also benefited from several international special leadership development programmes in about 10 researchintensive institutions that included the universities of Cambridge and Sheffield in the UK, and the Federal Institute for Educational Research, Innovation and Development of the School System in Austria.

"Those uncommon opportunities gave me not only skills but also access to a network of education researchers and practitioners.
The platform that the University of Reading provides is indeed a unique international currency with which its beneficiaries can purchase amazing opportunities to bless humanity in incredible ways."

TUITION FEES

The cost of your master's degree will depend on your programme of study and your fee status.

UK/home¹ and international fees for the 2024/25 academic year are listed within the subject pages of this prospectus and, unless otherwise stated, are for full-time study. For part-time courses, fees are calculated at 50% of the standard fee, or pro rata for modular programmes.

Many of our programmes require a deposit to secure your place. This information will be included in your offer letter.

SCHOLARSHIPS AND BURSARIES

University of Reading scholarships

- Centenary Scholarships. These are open to all eligible master's students and take the form of a partial fee waiver.
- Subject Scholarships. These are course-specific across 15 subject areas and also applied in the form of a tuition fee reduction.

Centenary and Subject Scholarships are competitive and typically awarded on the basis of previous academic accomplishment. For 2023/24 entry, awards were valued at £2,000 for UK/home-fee-paying students and £4,000 for international-fee-paying students. To apply, you first need to hold an offer of admission to one of our participating master's programmes for full-time or part-time study.²

We will confirm details for 2024/25 entry, including application deadlines and award amounts, on our website in December 2023.

If you completed your undergraduate degree with us, you're entitled to a discount on your master's degree at Reading. You'll automatically receive £1,500 off the cost of your full-time tuition fees, or if you're a part-time student studying over two years, you'll receive a £750 discount each year.

MASTER'S LOANS FOR UK STUDENTS

You can currently borrow up to £12,167 through a repayable government loan scheme for master's programmes starting on or after 1 August 2023.³ Loans are available for students under the age of 60 who don't already have a master's qualification or a higher level qualification. such as a PhD.

There is no specific deadline date for other programmes, and applications will be considered until the programme is full. However, we recommend that you apply as early as possible.

International applicants also need to ensure that there is enough time to make any visa applications. Most of our programmes start at the beginning of the autumn semester (September) but there are a number that start at a different time of the year (for example, February/March) or have multiple start points throughout the year.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

You are normally required to have a good undergraduate honours degree (typically 2:1 or above, though some programmes accept 2:2) or the equivalent from a university outside the UK. If you have other qualifications and a number of years' relevant work experience, then you may also be eliqible to apply.

You can study for many of our master's programmes even if you haven't studied the subject at undergraduate level, meaning you don't need any previous knowledge or experience in the subject area before applying – a fantastic opportunity to broaden your horizons or pursue a change of career.

However, some programmes do have additional subject-related or other entry requirements. These are specified in the subject pages of this prospectus, as well as on our course webpages.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEVELS

If you're a non-native English speaker, you will need to let us know your current level of English (through your most recent test score) when you apply and we will be happy to advise you on the best route to a University of Reading degree.

Our typical English language requirements (depending on the programme) are:

If there is an English proficiency condition stated in your offer, the best way to meet the language requirement is to attend our **Pre-Sessional English** (**PSE**) **programme**. By taking this course, you may also be entitled to a combined Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS), a single visa that entitles you to progress directly from your PSE course on to your degree programme. We have an active, purpose-built speech and language clinic with access to observational facilities. Additionally. vou can make use of our sound recording room.

We also work with the Centre for Integrative Neuroscience and Neurodynamics and the Centre for Literacy and Multilingualism. These centres provide eye-tracking, EEG. fMRI and TMS facilities, and a rich. multidisciplinary research environment.

PROFESSIONAL PLACEMENTS

In our MSc Speech and Language Therapy programme, we work closely with local speech and language therapy services, schools, hospitals, community clinics, and private and voluntary organisations, offering excellent and varied placement opportunities.² Many of our staff are also practising speech and language therapists, providing you with an opportunity to network with professionals in the sector.

TEACHING



At the Institute of Education, we support our students to become knowledgeable classroom practitioners, who are responsive to the individual needs of every child.

Our Initial Teacher Education (ITE) programmes educate our students through a curriculum that is academically rigorous and supports the practical application of the course.

Many courses include master's-level credits that are valid for five years after completion. These can be applied towards the MA Education should you wish to continue your studies.

EARLY YEARS

Learn how to teach and care for children from birth to 5 years. Discover more about their development and learning and how best to support them in a range of settings.

This course will award you Early Years Teacher Status (EYTS) and 60 master'slevel credits.

You'll be qualified to work in day care, nurseries, pre-schools, academies and free schools, as well as out-of-school settings, such as children's centres and childminding. This course is fully funded by the Department for Education.

PRIMARY

Our Primary courses support you on your journey to becoming an evidence-based classroom practitioner. You can take the Primary (5–11) programme or specialise in ages 3–7 or Special Educational Needs (SEN), benefiting from substantial school experience in mainstream or SEN settings.

The Postgraduate Certificate in Education (PGCE) contains master's-level assignments (60 credits) and is a Level 7 qualification. The Professional Graduate Certificate in Education (PgCE) is a Level 6 qualification. Both will provide you with Qualified Teacher Status (QTS).

SECONDARY

Our Secondary PGCE programme prepares you to teach students aged 11–18 and leads to QTS and 60 master's-level credits.

You'll benefit from substantial schoolbased training, developing teaching skills and curriculum knowledge, and you will learn how to become a research-informed subject specialist. For a list of subjects, see page 126.

FROM MASTER'S TO PHD: MEET HARDEEP

Hardeep studied BSc Biotechnology in Malaysia before coming to Reading for her master's degree in agriculture and development. She is currently pursuing a PhD in Food And Nutritional Sciences at Reading.

What brought you to Reading?

The School of Agriculture, Policy and Development has a great reputation for its research and development. I chose MSc Agriculture and Development because the modules offered were exactly the combination I was looking for. Choosing electives across the Department was great as it allowed me to pick the subjects I liked, such as climate change modules.

The green campus also attracted me, and the fact that the University of Reading is near London, which is a bonus point.

Why did you stay for your PhD?

My MSc degree at Reading helped me realise my passion and the direction I wanted to head. I was able to get insights from experts in the field, alongside developing research skills using the latest technologies during my dissertation project. I was also able to expand my network through the social and networking events organised by the Department and the University. The research environment helped me realise that I would like to pursue a career in research/academia. With my PhD project, I had an amazing opportunity to work with the Flavour Research Group in the Department, which made it a lot easier to decide to stay on at Reading.

How have you funded your postgraduate studies?

For my MSc degree, I was self-funded. For my PhD, I have a scholarship that is jointly funded by the Doctoral and Researcher College and ICRISAT (India) which allowed me to pursue my studies.

How is studying for a PhD different to studying for your master's degree?

Studying for a PhD involves more independent learning and decision making. It requires critical thinking from various aspects to justify the approach I am applying to my project. A master's degree involves taught modules in a classroom setting, whereas a PhD involves intensive learning and knowledge sharing within a research environment.

What is your typical day like as a PhD student at Reading?

It is really flexible depending on the phase of my project. I usually start with experiments in the laboratory, and during the day I analyse the data collected or read scientific articles for literature review. I really enjoy taking a walk around the Whiteknights lake in the evenings, or I network/socialise with my colleagues from the Department. I am also actively involved in roles outside my PhD, so I tend to have some other commitments during the week.

How does the Doctoral and Researcher College support you?

I have recently completed five Reading Researcher Development Programme (RRDP) courses that have been very useful to me as a first-year PhD student. There is a wide range of courses focused on skills development, such as techniques on data management, writing, personal development and many other aspects that are essential in doctoral study.
